

A growing population and workforce

The Orana region has a population of about 124,000 people, of which over 62,000 are in the workforce. The region has a proud reputation for a hard-working, reliable, and flexible workforce that's skilled across a diverse industrial bases. Central Orana's natural endowment as a centrally located region with a highly diverse and skilled workforce makes it an ideal place for investment.

A diverse economy

The Orana economy has quite distinct industry bases with strong historical foundations in mining, manufacturing and agriculture continuing as major contributors. It features productive farmland, rich mineral deposits and a range of services and industries including transport, manufacturing, construction, accommodation, healthcare, education and tourism. Opportunities are also emerging in food production and packaging, aged care and related services, renewable energy and niche tourism.

Connectivity

The Orana region is a well-connected and innovative region with growing opportunities across a range of sectors and across a vast and diverse geographical area. Major service and industry centers are well connected by road and rail to Sydney, Newcastle, Port Kembla and Canberra and their respective international gateways, along with the north–south access to Brisbane and Melbourne on the Newell Highway, and on to international trade routes. The region also has good connection to NBN.

Access to markets

The Central West and Orana's freight connections extend to Sydney, Newcastle, Wollongong, Brisbane, Melbourne, Broken Hill, Adelaide and Perth, with the Main West Rail line meeting the Inland Rail line in Parkes. The convergence of these corridors at several locations, including Dubbo and Parkes, is a competitive advantage for the region. Airports in Dubbo, Mudgee, Nyngan and Cobar connect to domestic centers, with major freight hubs in Parkes and Dubbo. The ability to export produce through Canberra Airport, along with opportunities associated with the new Western Sydney Airport, is a game changer for agricultural exports from the region.

An innovative region

The Orana region is a well-connected and innovative region with growing opportunities across a range of sectors including ag-tech, resources, and health. The region is embracing innovation as a major economic driver with a "can do" attitude that is fuelling sustained economic growth and a secure future. These factors, combined with the Orana's numerous other competitive advantages, have seen billions of dollars invested in recent years by a host of companies, including major national and international corporations.


Significant infrastructure investments

The \$9.3 billion Melbourne to Brisbane Inland Rail corridor will improve access to markets, reduce freight costs and boost the region's reputation as a freight hub with investment opportunities for facilities and intermodals. Dubbo will be home to the rail maintenance facility to service and maintain the new \$1.26 billion regional rail fleet. The Government has committed to and commenced numerous infrastructure development projects in the region, including road upgrades for the Mitchell and Newell Highways. These projects will reduce congestion, deliver safer, more efficient, and reliable journeys for those traveling in, around and through Dubbo, and better connect communities in the region.

The Central West region was announced as the first Renewable Energy Zone as part of the 2019 NSW Electricity Strategy. The registration of interest process conducted last year sparked an overwhelming response from investors attracting 113 registrations, totaling 27GW and valued at \$38 billion. The Central West REZ will play a vital role in delivering affordable energy to help replace the state's existing power stations as they retire over the coming decades.

Affordable country living

The Orana region offers diversity and opportunity ideal for family lifestyle with excellent schools and health facilities, coupled with a relaxed country environment. The region combines the attributes of larger centres with the familiarity and generosity of spirit typical of rural communities in western NSW.

REGIONAL HIGHLIGHTS CONTINUED

The global pandemic caused widespread labour shortages, and demand for skilled staff is at its peak. The workforce shortage means skilled employees are in hot demand and the region needs to remain highly competitive if we are to fill the gaps so crucial to the prosperity of the nation.

There are endless opportunities for jobseekers, those looking for a country change or transferring their skills into a new career path.

In July 2021, the Commonwealth Government announced the expansion of the Local Jobs Program to 51 employment regions including Far West Orana and Central West. This will include dedicated Employment Facilitators, a Local Jobs and Skills Taskforce and the development of a Local Jobs Plan. The Local Jobs Program will support tailored approaches to accelerate reskilling, upskilling and employment.

Migration

Regional migration experienced a significant challenge last year as a result of the Covid-19 pandemic that saw our international borders closed and travel restrictions imposed from state to state. Domestic and international border restrictions affected seasonal employers and workforces, resulting in fewer overseas seasonal workers available to meet the needs of the agricultural sector.

- Net regional migration 66% rise
- Internal migration 0.7% increase
- Total internal regional movement 0.2% decrease
- 11% rise of people moving from capitals to regional areas

Since the March 2020 quarter, an increasing number of people have departed capital cities for regional areas. The pandemic-driven acceleration of net regional migration indicates that those already in regional areas are finding reasons to stay while city dwellers are finding compelling reasons to relocate rather than stay in the various capitals.

Skilled Migration continues to be one part of the workforce solution and we anticipate that the border openings will provide much-needed boosts to many employers in the region seeking labour. As restrictions ease, the region is expected to continue to welcome migrant workers to fill the existing skills shortage.

Orana Designated Area Migration Agreement (DAMA) changes

The Government is providing employers in the Orana region with greater access to skilled workers by strengthening the Orana Designated Area Migration Agreement (DAMA), in order to meet labour-market challenges.



The Orana DAMA provides business owners in our region access to overseas workers, providing flexibility and responsiveness not available through the standard skilled migration programs.

"The Government aims to address businesses' needs with the inclusion of a range of occupations including automotive trades, teachers, aged care and additional health professionals."

Businesses in the Orana region now have access to overseas workers across 65 occupations.

Of particular importance to the region is the inclusion of ANZSCO Skill level 4 and 5 occupations, including clerks, aged care workers, mobile plant operators, security officers and waiters. The inclusion of more flexible permanent residency pathways under the Orana DAMA will incentivise overseas workers to set down roots in the region and make longterm economic and social contributions, including through transferring skills to local workers.

On 3 April 2019, the Australian Government entered into a DAMA with the Regional Development Australia (RDA) Orana (the Designated Area Representative). RDA Orana administers the process for accessing the Orana DAMA which is open to businesses operating in the region.

Businesses interested in sponsoring migrant workers can contact RDA Orana.

Western Cancer Center opened

The highly anticipated Western Cancer Centre in Dubbo was completed late last year, opening up for patients and bringing life-saving services much closer to home for people in regional and remote areas of Western NSW.

The Western Cancer Centre welcomed its first patients in September 2021, with a number of services moving into the facility at Dubbo Hospital since then.

The Australian Government provided \$25 million for the state-of-the-art facility, with the NSW Government contributing \$10 million. The completion of this project marks a historic milestone for the entire region. This facility will allow cancer patients to stay closer to their loved ones during treatment, significantly reducing the need to travel to Sydney or Newcastle for treatment, and vastly improving quality of life.

"This facility provides services that haven't been accessible in the region before, including medical oncology, radiation therapy and PET/CT diagnostic scans"



MAJOR INFRASTRUCTURE PROJECTS

Central West Orana REZ

Since 2020, Transgrid has been working with the NSW Government to plan new transmission infrastructure for Australia's first coordinated Renewable Energy Zone (REZ) in the Central-West Orana region.

In January 2022, the NSW Government, acting through Energy Corporation NSW (EnergyCo NSW) took responsibility for the development of the new transmission infrastructure for the Central-West Orana REZ Transmission.

Following a highly-subscribed tender process for the Central-West Orana renewable energy zone (REZ) transmission network, the government has named three consortiums:

- ACE Energy, comprising Acciona, Cobra and Endeavour Energy;
- Network REZolution, comprising Pacific Partnerships, UGL, CPB Contractors and APA Group
- NewGen Networks, comprising Plenary Group, Elecnor, Essential Energy and SecureEnergy

The network operator will design, finance, build, operate and maintain the network infrastructure for the Central-West Orana REZ, with new grid connections to include energy hubs and new high-capacity transmission lines.

The revised study corridor for new transmission infrastructure will minimise impacts on prime agricultural land in the region and enable the delivery of greater capacity for the Central-West Orana REZ to meet future energy needs. The new route is expected to accommodate additional transmission lines, offering options to deliver nearly four times the amount of renewable power to the grid with the same infrastructure.

Inland Rail

More towns and communities in the region will soon be reaping the benefits of Inland Rail, as the project continues to breathe new life into regional economies.

This billion dollar project will be a key driver of growth for regional communities, stimulating investment, supporting new jobs and opportunities for local businesses to grow and build capability.

"New modelling shows Inland Rail could cut freight transport costs by up to \$213 million a year, resulting in huge savings for businesses and industries that use the line and further driving the growth of regional Australia."

Businesses relying on road-based supply chains will benefit most from the switch, profiting from the average transport saving of \$80.77 per tonne (\$179 million per annum). Savings will only increase as Australia's freight task grows in the future.

Other projected savings for intermodal freight include an average:

- \$90 per tonne (44 per cent) reduction along the entire route from Melbourne and Brisbane;
- \$184 per tonne (47 per cent) reduction between Brisbane and Parkes, connecting to Perth;
- \$48 per tonne (22 per cent) reduction from Brisbane and connecting to Adelaide; and
- \$62 per tonne (31 per cent) reduction for regional intermodal freight to and from major metropolitan centres and ports.

According to the CSIRO's Inland Rail Supply Chain Mapping Project report, once fully operational, Inland Rail will take 200,000 trucks off the road each year, or 150 B-doubles for each train travelling between Melbourne and Brisbane. The Australian Rail Track Corporation partnered with ACCIONA and CPB Contractors Joint Venture (ACACPB JV), to work on the Southern Civil Works Program. The companies have committed to employing local people, engaging with local businesses and suppliers and working with communities along the route to ensure the advantages of Inland Rail are felt throughout the Narromine to Narrabri section.

Regional Rail – Mindyarra Maintenance Centre

The NSW Government is replacing the ageing NSW regional rail fleet of XPT, XPLORER and Endeavour trains, and constructing a purpose-built maintenance facility in Dubbo, named 'Mindyarra' that will support the new Regional Rail fleet and stimulate the regional economy.

In February 2019, NSW Government awarded a contract to Momentum Trains, an international consortium to deliver the Regional Rail Project. The Regional Rail project contract includes the design, build and maintenance of the new Regional Rail fleet, and also the design, build, maintenance and operation of the new purpose-built Mindyarra Maintenance Centre in Dubbo.

The new Main Western rail line was laid in February 2022 at the site to allow the new Regional Rail fleet to access the centre for service and maintenance.

Major construction of the centre is currently underway, with the maintenance centre expected to be completed in 2022.

Building a Better Dubbo – transport infrastructure projects

Together, the Australian Government and the New South Wales Government are investing \$301.2 million in five Building a better Dubbo transport infrastructure projects.

As of December 2021, the Building a Better Dubbo program had proudly delivered four of the five road upgrades in Dubbo, saving travel time and enabling more efficient freight transport and time-saving benefits to motorists in and around Dubbo. What has been completed:

- Newell Highway upgrade, West Dubbo
- Newell Highway Mitchell Highway intersection upgrade
- LH Ford Bridge strengthening
- Mitchell Highway (Cobra Street) and Fitzroy Street intersection upgrade

Early works program for the Newell Highway Upgrade, New Dubbo Bridge has commenced. Tenders were invited on 28 April 2022. This \$200 million project will improve freight efficiency on the Newell Highway, reduce traffic congestion and provide an additional route during flood events. It will assist in easing congestion in Dubbo when most needed.

Mitchell Highway upgrade, Dubbo to Narromine

The NSW Government is investing \$32 million to construct overtaking lanes and safety upgrades on the Mitchell Highway between Dubbo and Narromine.

The project involves building three new overtaking lanes and safety improvement works. The overtaking lanes that will be constructed are located at:

- Lagoon Creek
- Mylangra
- Tantitha

Work has started on the Lagoon Creek overtaking on the Mitchell Highway, 17km west of Dubbo. Safety upgrades will also be delivered at the same time including flexible safety barriers, rumbles strips and wider centrelines.



Advanced manufacturing precinct in Narromine

Engineering company Simmons Global will relocate operations from Western Australia to Narromine, thanks to a \$4.8m grant from the Regional Job Creation Fund.

This funding will help deliver an advanced manufacturing precinct that produces everything from unmanned aerial drones to solar UV monitors that tell teachers when students should play in the shade, as well as help upskill local indigenous and youth workers through apprenticeships.

Narromine has experienced record development and growth in recent years and the establishment of Simmons Global will help strengthen and diversify the economic base and give existing businesses confidence for a bright future.

The advanced manufacturing precinct is expected to kick off in 2022 and start production on technology such as aerial drones and solar UV monitors.

Other businesses across the Shire also benefited from the first round of the Regional Job Creation Fund that saw a good number of projects receiving up to 50% of their project costs in grant funding.

The \$140 million Regional Job Creation Fund was established to support existing businesses in regional NSW to grow and encourage interstate or overseas businesses to invest in regional NSW.

EMERGING INDUSTRIES

Energy and renewables

The state government's plan to deliver a 3GW renewable energy zone (REZ) in the Central-West has continued to receive support through the revised transmission corridor that maximizes options to unlock more renewable energy in the future.

The Central-West Orana REZ was the first of five designated clean energy zones detailed in the NSW Government's Electricity Infrastructure Roadmap.

As Australia's first REZ, the Central-West Orana REZ is pivotal to the NSW government's plan to inject at least 12GW of renewable energy and 2GW of energy storage into the grid before 2030 to fill the gap created by the retirement of the state's thermal-fuel generation fleet.

The Central West REZ is expected to bring up to \$5.2 billion in private investment to the Central-West Orana region by 2030, and support around 3,900 construction jobs and 500 ongoing jobs in the region.

The Central-West Orana REZ is expected to be shovelready by the end of 2022 and produce enough clean energy to power 1.4 million homes when complete.

As one of the faster developing REZs, there are many looking to the region as a leader and early adopter, including governments, renewable energy developers and other regional communities across Australia.

"Stage 1 of the Central-West Orana REZ, which encompasses approximately 20,000 square kilometres centred in Dubbo, is planned to unlock at least 3GW of new network capacity by the mid-2020s, enough to power 1.4 million homes."

Plans for transmission to support development of the New South Wales Central-West Orana Renewable Energy Zone are progressing as planned with Transgrid beginning community consultation on the proposed transmission corridor earlier in the year. The company has been meeting and working with landowners and local communities to discuss constraints and opportunities within the study corridor, including carrying out environmental surveys to help with informing route identification.

- 180Km corridor
- Shovel ready end of 2023
- Construction commence Jan 2024 and completed July 2025
- \$5.2 billion investment unlocked by 2030
- 3900 peak construction jobs
- 500 ongoing jobs

Transgrid is planning new 500kV and 330 kV transmission lines, substation(s) and related infrastructure to support the development of the Central-West Orana REZ. Investment in the new infrastructure will allow renewable energy providers from the region to connect to the grid and enable more affordable, reliable and clean energy for New South Wales customers.

The government has further confirmed it will invest an extra \$84 million in the key bodies needed to accelerate the implementation of its Electricity Infrastructure Roadmap and provide \$47.5 million to accelerate the development of pumped hydro in the state. This funding is on top of the \$380 million announced in the 2021 Budget to support the delivery of the Roadmap.

Value-added manufacturing

"The onset of the COVID-19 pandemic revealed the importance of a local manufacturing supply chain and highlighted some of the region's unrealised industry capabilities."

The Orana region is moving to higher value added manufacturing and food processing. These industries include organic and free-range production, grain milling, animal product and fiber processing, pet food manufacturing, packaging of raw fruits, vegetables and meats, and the processing of foods such as dairy products. Local manufacturers are increasingly investing new and innovative technology or employing advanced business models that allow them to compete favorably both locally and globally.

With a collaborative research and development center at the core of the region, the Orana region is positioned to become a significant hub for advanced manufacturing.

Many manufacturing businesses are expanding in the region and investing in innovative technologies. All this investment will help attract top talent to the region, driving economic development and job creation.

Food and agribusiness

The Orana region is moving to higher value-added manufacturing and food processing such as organic and free-range production, grain milling, animal product and fibre processing, pet food manufacturing, packing of raw fruits, vegetables, meats and seeds, and the processing of foods such as dairy products.

The expansion of the agricultural supply chain including key transport infrastructure and facilities, supporting secondary processing facilities and transport and logistics industries has led to the growth and development of agribusiness in the region.

The diversity and quality of agricultural commodities provide enormous potential for value-added opportunities. Processing facilities in the Central West rely partly on agricultural produce from the Orana and vice versa. The established processing and manufacturing industries in Dubbo, Blayney, Manildra and Bathurst encourage related industry development and attract investment. The synergies between the Central West and Orana region will maximise future innovation opportunities and increase productivity.

The region has access to international markets via Port of Newcastle, Port Botany, Sydney Airport and Canberra Airport. Products such as beef, lamb, goat, and dairy are already being exported to South East Asia.

Inland Rail, Western Sydney International Airport, improved road and rail links to Newcastle along with the proposed program of upgrades to the Great Western Highway will all open new domestic and international markets.

Mining, Energy & Transport Services (METS)

The resources sector is the leading contributor to the region's economy, accounting for \$5.1 billion (25.9%) of the region's total economic output.

The Orana region hosts several commodities including coal, copper, silver, lead, zinc, gold, and critical minerals. There are several established mines in the region, with another handful being developed or going through feasibility studies. Notable mines include CSA Mine (Glencore) and Peak Gold and Hera (Aurelia), both in Cobar; Tritton Copper Operations (Aeris Resources); Northparkes (CMOC-Northparkes Mines); Tomingley Gold Operations (Alkane Resources Ltd); Cadia (Newcrest); Wilpinjong Mine (Peabody Energy); Moolarben Coal (Yancoal); Ulan Coal (Glencore Australia); and Springvale and Clarence Colliery (Centennial Coal).

The vast mining industry in the region is undergoing rapid transformation. As regulations change to stimulate investment, new mining-operating models are attracting private investment. Exploration for copper, gold, and essential minerals is gaining traction in the region. There is interest in zirconia resources in Dubbo, as well as a scandium project in Nyngan, which is now in the planning and evaluation stage.

The region has proven to be a valuable testing ground for new technologies and processes thanks to its established resources sector, and there is an appetite for innovation that looks set to grow as the region continues to see investment in its projects and resources, particularly around critical minerals. The CMOC Northparkes Mine, which runs a number of automation programmes, including driver-less loaders, is a leader in the region when it comes to automation.

COVID-19


Business conditions have been challenging since the start of the pandemic in early 2020. The various lockdowns have caused major disruptions to economic activity. While businesses in the region are no longer operating in COVID crisis mode, trading conditions have been volatile and there are signs of a multispeed economy as different sectors and businesses are recovering at a different pace. Some have seen their operations back on track, while many others are still struggling.

In the midst of the pandemic and the host of measures and restrictions it requires, the region has continued to show resilience during these challenging economic times. A lot has been learnt, and there is an opportunity to harness the innovations and lessons learnt during the COVID-19 pandemic to ensure we rebuild the economy to be even more resilient and self-sufficient into the future.

The COVID-19 pandemic created short-term disruptions and provoked long-term changes in how the world lives and does business. The economic impact of COVID-19 continues to diverge across the region and country since the pandemic began. The primary impacts were particularly evident in:

- Business closures due to lockdowns and other containment measures
- Changing business operations due to work-fromhome requirements
- Job losses as a result of business closures
- Restricted interstate and international travel impacting tourism
- International supply chain interruptions
- Falling consumer demand and business confidence

Individuals and businesses faced significant pressures in 2021-22 with restrictions imposed as a result of the growing pandemic. Business confidence dropped with some businesses being forced to close down due to financial pressures. The business exit rate in the region in March 2021 was 0.9%.



The COVID-19 pandemic has accelerated changes in consumption patterns which can create negative consequences for regional businesses. The switch to online purchasing is favouring high volume online outlets, pulling the rug out from underneath many regional businesses. Regional businesses can't compete well on high volume essentials, and are most competitive on high value products and most importantly, on services. But the collapse in spending has stalled local businesses everywhere, especially in regions.

It is now more important than ever to push our dollar further and support the notion of "think local, buy local" to ensure support for our region.

Despite the fact that a record percentage of Australians are unemployed or underemployed, consumer expenditure is increasing. How and where individuals and businesses choose to spend money will have a big impact on our recovery as a region.

Housing has remained a significant challenge for the region particularly in the last year. Housing pressures continued to increase with major centers like Dubbo and Mudgee recording very high price growth, with housing prices jumping by 47.3 percent between March 2020 and September 2021 in these towns.

- Average change in rent since March 2020: +17.3%
- Average change in property prices: +33.2%
- Median property prices: \$231,700

Covid-19 impacted some industries more than others, with Accommodation and Food Services and Retail Trade being the most impacted in the region. Tourism and accommodation industries are important job providers in the region, employing over 3000 people across the Orana region before the pandemic. The tourism industry was significantly affected by the pandemic with the Food and Accommodation sector taking the biggest hit between 2020-21.

COVID-19 has a short-term impact on tourism flow, and the region has already started to experience recovery. Tourism in the region is driven mainly by the domestic, rather than the international market. This means that as recovery timeframes for international tourism are expected to be longer.



AEC COVID Resilience Indicator: This indicator provides guidance on the extent to which COVID-19 impacted the region in terms of employment, businesses activities, and broader economic activity.

Overall, the region has shown great resilience averaging 7.5 and above for each scoring index. The region showed very strong industry value-add resilience scoring 8.4. The Covid resilience score for the region averaged at 7.9.

ROAD TO RECOVERY

The Orana region has faced recent tough economic times following drought, bushfires, floods, and the COVID-19 pandemic. The Federal and State Governments have continued to support and roll out key incentives for individuals, small businesses, local governments and community groups.

The NSW economy is back on the road to recovery, with the government committing to:

- assist businesses to expand, establish, invest and create more jobs
- ensure communities get the services they need to recover, grow and thrive
- protect and improve the environment and local character of regions
- enable the continued response to recent natural disasters of storm, flood and COVID-19

- prepare for the future with drought and regional water strategies
- and improve road, rail and digital connections between the regions and the cities .


The mineral and energy resources sectors make a significant economic contribution, with new mining opportunities emerging across the region. Landmark solar, wind and bioenergy projects distinguish the region as a leader in renewable energy development.

The Orana region is home to world class mines and deposits, including both 'traditional' metals like gold and copper, and 'new' high-tech metals like scandium, cobalt and rare earth metals. The region's mining sector includes coal mining concentrated around Mudgee; gold, silver and copper mining; and emerging opportunities for rare earth mining in other parts of the region, including Dubbo.

Renewable energy generation is expected to create a more sustainable energy future for the region.

Growth in wind energy, solar energy and bioenergy generation will promote local jobs in smaller communities and development opportunities for associated industries. Wind generation opportunities are focused around the tablelands and slopes of the Central West, while the large open plains of the Orana provide the best access for solar energy generation.

There is significant mineral potential across the region for the resource and energy sector. Now more than ever, the Orana and Central West are the focal points for infrastructure, METS, energy and business development opportunities. The region is home to 33 operating mines and highly prospective opportunities including commodities associated with modern high-technology applications such as copper, silver, and gold, and strategic minerals, including scandium, platinum group elements, cobalt, lithium, titanium, and zirconium.



Competition for exploration investment is strong both within Australia and internationally. The Orana region is well positioned to attract this investment and supply the metals needed to underpin the economies and societies of the future.

There are exciting opportunities for the industry with the O2N Export Hub established to support industry and business development in the METS sector for the Orana and Central West regions. More than 30 coal projects and mine extensions are proposed for development in NSW over the next decade, premised on world class utilisation of the estimated 11 billion tonnes of NSW recoverable coal reserves. A good number of these are in the Central West and Orana regions.

Agricultural production in the Orana is diverse and includes irrigated cotton, lucerne, winter cereals, horticulture as well as extensive areas of dryland cropping, livestock grazing (including beef, sheep and wool), and timber production in the region's east.


The region contains unique production areas with industries of limited geographical spread. These are clustered due to various factors including climate, topography, water needs and proximity to processors. The LGAs contributing the most in terms of total agricultural commodity value are Narromine (mostly wheat and cotton) and Coonamble (mostly mixed farming).

The Orana region has a strong agricultural history. The scenic tablelands support cool climate viticulture, forestry and grazing. The slopes and plains support diverse agribusiness enterprises, and broadscale and irrigated agriculture. These diverse agricultural industries provide employment for people living in areas such as Narromine and Coonamble, both directly in production and indirectly in supporting agribusiness. The diversity and quality of agricultural commodities provide enormous potential for value-added opportunities. The region has a range of successful agribusinesses from multinationals to niche producers of artisanal food stemming across dryland cropping, irrigation, horticulture, viticulture and orchard growing. Diversification has helped to expand agricultural activities, businesses and industries, making agribusiness one of the most important economic sectors.

Agriculture and the value chain provide significant employment and exports from the region. The main regional agricultural commodities have shown sustained growth in terms of value of production.




Widespread public and private investment has led to extensive development along with additions, alterations, reconstruction, installation, maintenance and repair of buildings and other structures.

As the third largest employing industry in Australia, construction has grown by 33% in the past 11 years. In the Orana, employment in the construction industry has grown at an annual rate of 15%, contributing to 7.4% of the workforce.

Food product manufacturing dominates the manufacturing industry in the Orana region and is fed by the growing agricultural industry.

Manufacturing is a growing sector in the Orana, with the region's great diversity reflected by what is directly produced.

Health care and social assistance services are in increasing demand across regional Australia, including the Orana region. These services are important not only for the wellbeing and quality of life of people in regions, but they can also support the economic development of the region itself.

While traditionally the public sector provided the 'backbone' of health services in a region, the private sector is increasingly playing a role in both health care and social assistance, particularly in response to changing consumer expectations.


Significant public and private sector investment has been made into the healthcare and social assistance sector in the Orana region and there is a range of services available in emergency, chronic health care, aged care, mental health and specialist treatment. More than \$300 million has been spent on upgrades to the public hospitals in the major centres of Dubbo and Mudgee and in the smaller communities.

The industry is the second largest employer in the region employing 6,672 people across the region, with over 50% of the workforce being in Dubbo.

The region has experienced difficulties in attracting and retaining skilled professionals, such as general practitioners. Remote communities obtain services from Broken Hill, Cobar or Dubbo, with most primary health care services provided only on a visiting basis. The provision of training and educational support is a huge factor in continuing and extending the level of health services in the region. Institutions such as Charles Sturt University, the Western Institute of TAFE, and the University of Sydney's School of Rural Health all contribute to the future development and mentoring of health professionals in the region including doctors, dentists, surgeons, pharmacists and nursing professionals.

The health care and education sectors will deliver important services, particularly around existing health facilities in Dubbo and Mudgee. With an ageing population, demand for health services will increase in both cities and local centres, as will demand and opportunities for skilled workers to provide these services.

Opportunities exist in Nyngan, Bourke and Cobar to leverage investment in existing public health facilities to provide complementary health services that meet community need and support local employment.

The \$112 million Dubbo Hospital Redevelopment will provide new and revitalised facilities to meet the increasing demand for health services in and around the Dubbo region. Stages 1 and 2 are complete, and stages 3 and 4 of the redevelopment is underway. Once complete, the redevelopment will cement Dubbo Hospital's place as a major rural referral centre and acute care hospital for specialty services in Dubbo and surrounding areas.


As the economy and population profile of the region changes, so does the demand for skilled workers, particularly in the health, education, manufacturing, mining and renewable energy sectors.


There are a variety of private and public education facilities and providers across the Orana region. These range from early childhood centres through to university campuses and vocational education as well as government and private institutions, giving people of all ages an opportunity for educational advancement. Expanding tertiary education services and online access to education will continue to increase access to services and sustain community wellbeing, particularly in smaller and isolated communities.

70.58% of the population in Orana have at least a year 10 qualification while 0.4% of the population have no school education.

The education system is a large employer in the region, with schools in every town and city across the Orana. Many of these are government-employed in the publicschool system, along with privately-run institutions. The education system in NSW is regularly upgraded to keep improving the standard of learning for students.

The Orana region's connections along major transport links support domestic and international supply chains and contribute to a diverse and productive regional economy.

The Central West and Orana's freight connections extend to Sydney, Newcastle, Wollongong, Brisbane, Melbourne, Broken Hill, Adelaide and Perth, with the Main West Rail line meeting the Inland Rail line in Parkes. The convergence of these corridors at several locations, including Dubbo and Parkes, is a competitive advantage.

There are significant drivers of change emerging including increasing productivity in agriculture, an expanding mining sector and diversification of the manufacturing industry. The region is a major exporter of lamb, beef, wool, cotton, grain, raw minerals and metals, manufactured food and beverages and other value-added produce. The transport industry in this area is characterised by a freight and logistics network that is well supported by road and rail connectivity

Upgrades to transport and freight networks will facilitate economic growth and diversification by unlocking new export opportunities, strengthening the region's cities and centre and enhancing productivity of the agricultural, mining and natural resources sectors.

The development of the Melbourne to Brisbane Inland Rail, alongside upgrades to the Newell and Golden Highways, has the potential to transform the Central West and Orana into one of the key freight and logistics destinations in Australia. In doing so, it will create more dynamic and resilient communities adapting to changing economic, social and environmental circumstances.

ROAD

The Orana region has strong transport networks with access to major highways like the Golden Highway through Dubbo, Mitchell Highway (through Bogan, Bourke, Dubbo, Narromine and Warren), Barrier Highway (through Bogan and Cobar), Kamilaroi (through Bourke, Brewarrina, and Walgett), Castlereagh (through Brewarrina, Coonamble and Gilgandra), Newell Highway (through Dubbo, Gilgandra and Warrumbungle Shire), Oxley (through Gilgandra, Warren and Warrumbungle), Kidman Way through Cobar, the Great Inland Way through Coonamble, Katoomba, and the Great Western Highways through Mid-Western Regional

AIR

The Orana region has access to air travel with Dubbo Regional Airport being the largest and busiest airport in the region, servicing most of the neighbouring towns in the region, including Narromine. It is one of the leading regional airports in Australia, located on the Mitchell Highway. The Airport offers direct services from Dubbo to Sydney, Melbourne, Brisbane, Newcastle and Broken Hill, serviced by Regional Express (REX), Fly Corporate, Fly Pelican and QantasLink. There are other airports in the region including Nyngan Airport, Bourke Airport, Cobar Airport and Mudgee Airport.

RAIL

Transporting freight via rail connects the farms, mines and cities to domestic and international markets. The region has an efficient and accessible rail transport network that benefits both communities and industry. The Main Western Railway Line connects the inland to Sydney, running through Bathurst, Orange, Wellington, Narromine, Nyngan and Bourke. The Country Link rail coach runs from Broken Hill to Dubbo, linking with the XPT in Dubbo. NSW Train link Regional Coach service runs between Dubbo and Broken Hill via Nyngan and Cobar.

Across NSW, freight volumes are expected to double by 2030 and triple by 2050. A large portion of this growth is expected in the Orana region, which will result in the need for a substantial upgrade and expansion of the existing transport networks.

Major project: Inland Rail

The 1,700km route will link Melbourne and Brisbane via regional Victoria, NSW and Queensland. The project commenced in 2018 and is expected to be completed in 2025.

The Inland Rail is expected to return \$480M to the economies of Central and North West NSW, and will increase the volumes of grain, cotton, beef and other commodities being transported by rail by making it easier to move freight from farms, mines and ports to domestic and international markets. Within the Orana region, there are two sections of railway line being developed: Parkes to Narromine and Narromine to Narrabri.

The Orana is a popular tourist destination for domestic and international visitors. The region has experienced an increase in the number of domestic tourists in the past year as result of the restricted travel enforced due to the Covid-19 pandemic. There has been an increase in local tourism as visitors from other parts of NSW and Interstate continue to visit regional attractions, subject to travel restrictions.

Agritourism represents a diverse and unique tourism offering, including food and wine trails, farm stays, farmers markets and farm gate experiences

The greatest number of visitors to the region came from other parts of NSW, with interstate visitors coming from Victoria and Queensland. Visits to the Orana region are made principally for holiday purposes while some came to see relatives or friends. On average, a domestic day visitor spends \$165 per trip, while a domestic overnight visitor spends \$173 per night and \$471 per trip.





Increased visitor numbers are boosting significant growth in tourism-related businesses and employment, including accommodation providers. This is driving the regional economy which in turn is adding to infrastructure and investment opportunities.

Increasing visitation and expenditure requires complementary products and experiences, including ecoaccommodation, nature-based and cultural experiences, food and wine (including agritourism) experiences, adventure activities and event facilities. Investment from the NSW Government and councils can facilitate private sector investment and increase tourism numbers. Nationally, domestic and international tourism losses have totaled \$101.7 billion since the start of the pandemic. These losses comprised \$38.3 billion for domestic overnight travel; \$12.1 billion for domestic day trips and \$51.3 billion for international travel.

The industry sector in Orana Region which captures the most value from visitor expenditure is Accommodation & Food Services. It is estimated that this sector captures \$0.532 for every dollar spent by visitors to the Orana Region.






Visitor expenditure per dollar







The largest industry is Mining, representing 25.7% of the economy followed by Rental, Hiring and Real Estate Services (12.2%) and Agriculture, Forestry and Fishing (9.7%). More than half of the region's GRP is shared across the four largest industries.



OUTPUT

The Orana Region economy generates an estimated \$19.873 billion in output. Orana Region represents 1.5% of the \$1.291 trillion output generated in New South Wales, and 0.5% of the \$4.183 trillion output generated in Australia. The largest contributor to annual economic output in Orana Region is Mining, which represents 25.9 percent of total output. The area in Orana Region generating the most output is Mudgee Region – West, and the largest industry here is Mining.



POPULATION

The Orana region has witnessed a slow but steady growth in population over the last decade. Between 2010 and 2020, the resident population of the region grew from 119,830 to 122,967. The annualised growth rate for the region is 0.28% compared to 1.38% for New South Wales.



The largest age cohort in the Orana region is 50-59 years.

The most recent projections show that the Orana region is expected to reach a population of 126,641 by 2041, an increase of 3,674 people over 20 years. Much of the growth will be concentrated in larger towns like Dubbo, Mudgee and Cobar.

The recent trends brought about by the COVID-19 pandemic show that the population predictions might change as more people are looking to move away from populated metropolitan areas and into regional areas.



EMPLOYMENT

The Orana Region economy supports an estimated 49,871 jobs, representing 1.5% of the 3,358,119 people working in New South Wales, and 0.5% of the 10,683,322 people working in Australia. In Orana Region, the locality of Dubbo – South contains the highest number of jobs.

The unemployment rate was on a steady decline in the region prior to the COVID-19 pandemic. This was attributed to the steady growth of industries that provide enough opportunities for the growing population.

The region has always had lower unemployment compared to the State average.

The participation rate is the key to the local economy, indicating the number of people that are working and earning. The participation rate has decreased in the last year despite the increase in population and unemployment. According to the 2016 ABS data, 34.52% of the population in the region are not in the labour force, while 33.16% work full time.

The largest employing industry in the region is Agriculture, Forestry and Fishing, employing 13.46% of the workforce, followed by Healthcare & Social Assistance with 13.38% and Retail Trade at 9.8%.





Orana's labour market has rebounded strongly after the height of the pandemic – just about recouping the momentum that had existed prior to its onset.

It is becoming increasingly apparent that our region, like many other regional areas, is running into supply constraints. Job vacancies continue to grow significantly with the region recording 135% increase in job advertisements in the last quarter. In contrast, actual levels of employment have staggered with employment participation rates decreasing.

IMPORT AND EXPORT MARKET

The value of intermediate goods and services imported into Orana Region by local industry sectors is estimated at \$5.446 billion. Orana Region represents 3.1% of the \$173.470 billion imported into New South Wales, and 1% of the \$564.113 billion imported into Australia.

Orana Region's Mining sector spends an estimated \$1.6 billion on regional imports, more than any other sector.

The value of regional exports generated by the Orana Region economy is estimated at \$8.592 billion. Orana Region represents 4.7% of the \$181.730 billion regional exports generated in New South Wales, and 1.5% of the \$566.109 billion regional exports generated in Australia.







Building approvals by value



BUSINESS CONFIDENCE

After a tough start to 2022 due to the Omicron wave of COVID and flooding, businesses are now faced with further uncertainties both global and domestic. The war in Ukraine has impacted global commodity markets, leading to further concerns about supply chain disruptions and commodity prices.

The combined impact of drought, bushfires and the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic has impacted business confidence across the region, like many other regions across the state and country. As of April 2022, Business NSW reported business confidence in the Far West and Orana as -44.4. Even though overall, business confidence

remains weak, there are signs of improvement. Despite the negative reading, the latest Business Confidence Index for current conditions rebounded from the previous quarter.

The greatest challenge currently facing the business community is rising costs. Inflationary pressures have intensified since 2021 due to both supply-side constraints and improved demand on the back of the economic recovery.

WORKFORCE ATTRACTION

The Region is well positioned as a growing agricultural, manufacturing and mining centre, with flourishing mining and exploration projects both established and emerging.

Both skilled and semi-skilled labour rate highly as areas of need across the region. Over the last few years, the

region has seen vacancies increase for all skill levels, with the strongest rise recorded for technical and trade related jobs. A majority of the population in the region have a certificate level qualification.
